**ANNUAL REPORT 2022-2023** 



It has been another exciting year of growth for Classical Uprising:

- We've grown our audiences at our sold-out holiday series Sing We Noël, which this year featured a cast of 100 singers from Oratorio Chorale, Sweetest in the Gale, and Horizon Voices;
- We've grown our stature in the performing arts world, garnering the Ernst Bacon Memorial Award for the Performance of American Music in this year's American Prize competition;
- We've grown our programming to better serve all ages through expanded enrollment in our Horizon Voices youth choir program;
- We've grown our sources of inspiration and education by bringing GRAMMY-winning soloists and cutting-edge composers to Maine; and
- We've grown our impact on our community through musical outreach programs like our free street-fair style Carnival Concert performed at Reiche Community School.

We are also devoting more time to listening to, and learning from, our singers, audiences, and community members to refine our programming. We launched a strategic planning initiative last year to ensure both Classical Uprising's long-term financial sustainability and our continued ability to deliver outstanding musical experiences that move, challenge, and delight our audience members. #### Letter from the Artistic Director



Two things my dad taught us as kids growing up were: 1) "take your own temperature"—a.k.a. take stock of what you've accomplished and how it feels—so that: 2) you can craft an (ever-changing and non-restrictive) ten-year plan with intent and direction.

During the 2022-2023 season, Classical Uprising frequently took our organizational temperature. We reviewed what we've accomplished and considered where we are today. It was the third year since the merger of Oratorio Chorale and Portland Bach Experience created Classical Uprising, and the third year since we founded Horizon Voices. It was the second year of a partnership with Bowdoin College, and the first year in which we were (nearly) out of the shadow of COVID-19. And, on top of all that, we were rapidly approaching the 50th anniversary season of Oratorio Chorale.

We assessed what we achieved this season and how it felt:

- We won a national award from The American Prize for our artistry;
- We presented brave and bold artistic productions that reached back in time and out into space;
- We welcomed a nationally respected composer to coach singers and connect with our community; and
- We performed 45 concerts and events, with 22 open to the public free of charge.

On top of that, half of Oratorio Chorale concerts sold out; Sweetest in the Gale has a full roster and a waiting list; Horizon Voices increased enrollment by 20%; 25 grantors and sponsors supported our work; and we collaborated

with more than 30 community businesses and organizations.

These numbers matter because they tell us that Classical Uprising is providing the services we all need for connecting, reflecting, and taking our own temperature as we continue to move through a changing world. We are also asking you, through one-on-one interviews, group discussions, and online surveys, what you and your neighbors need from the arts and how Classical Uprising can deliver these distinct, deep, and connective experiences more effectively.

A ten-year plan as I know it is about creating a bold and expansive vision for the future, and we want to keep hearing from you as we shape those goals. Everything we do hinges on the belief that you and your community will be supported, inspired, and entertained because of our performances, educational programs, and community events. I have lots of plans for five, ten, and twenty years down the road, and I look forward to seeing them flourish as we work together to help our community thrive.


